He focused on capturing the art, before it decays, falls apart or floats away.

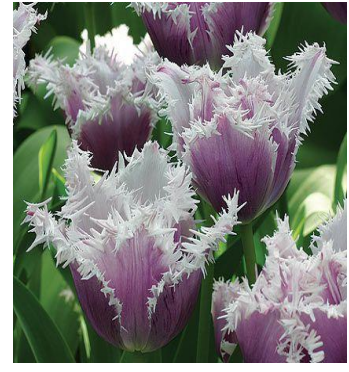
Now it is your turn to find branches, leaves, pebbles and different form of stones to create your own artwork inspired by Andy Goldsworthy.

## Task Two- paper tulip



Tulips bloom in early to late spring. Because tulips are one of the first flowers to bloom in the spring, they can mean rebirth and new beginnings. Tulips come in all different colours and shapes.

- Looking at the photos, what are the similarities and differences between each tulip?
- How are the petals shaped in each image?
- What do you think a flower needs to grow?

To make our own tulips, you can use any type of paper, but make sure the paper you are using is a square shape.

- 1-Use any paper to create the tulips.
- 2-Fold your square paper in half to create a triangle.
- 3-Then fold the two corners upwards.
- 4-Now you have your tulip!
- 5-Create different tulips of different sizes. You can also use different paper with different patterns and textures to create unique tulips.
